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The Shadow of the Cross

Let's face it. Being the humans that we are, we hear some truths that we would rather not know. How many times have you gotten a letter in the mail and looked at the return address and thought that it might be bad news: a bill that you could not afford to pay, a notice you would rather not receive, a message that you anticipated, but that you did not want to hear? What did you do? If you are like me, you probably hesitated, set it aside, hoping it would go away, and waited 'till you had the strength to face up to the thing you would rather not confront just yet.

There are truths in God's Word that are that way, too: truths that, if we had our choice we would rather avoid as long as possible. Sometimes we do avoid them. Sometimes we pretend that they do not apply to us, that our situation is different, that God has blessed us in a unique way that has exempted us from the truths that apply to everyone else.

Today we come to one of those messages of God's Word that we would rather not hear, written in the Gospel of John, "If the world hates you, you know that it has hated Me before it hated you. If you were of the world, the world would love its own; but because you are not of the world, but I chose you out of the world, because of this the world hates you. (John 15:18-19)

The simple truth here is this: the Church of Jesus Christ is always the suffering church, always the persecuted church, always sent by God into the world to endure abuse and tribulation in His name. No matter how well things are going for us here today, no matter how blessed we are, no matter how comfortable our lives, the Church of Jesus Christ always lives in the shadow of the cross.

Christ Himself has called us into the shadow of the cross. Speaking of the people of Israel, God said, "**For this reason also the wisdom of God said, 'I will send to them prophets and apostles, and some of them they will kill and some they will persecute,'**" (Luke 11:49)

Just as He sent the early disciples to be persecuted and killed, so God sends us into the world and, as He sends us, into the world He says to us: **Then Jesus said to His disciples, "If anyone wishes to come after Me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross, and follow Me. For whoever wishes to save his life shall lose it; but whoever loses his life for My sake shall find it. (Matthew 16:24-25)**

This Word of God has been fulfilled in the life of His Church. The people of Christ

have always been persecuted. There was the first martyr, Stephen, who died for Christ. The second martyr was James and after James there came many others. Some, like Bishop Polycarp of Smyrna or the young woman known as Perpetua, became famous because their deeds and words were written down and their faithful witness treasured by the Church. But countless others suffered and died, their names unknown and their deeds unrecorded in the Church's books—their names and deeds and faithful witness treasured by God alone,

So it has been down through the ages, wherever the name of Christ was proclaimed. And so it is today. Today the shadow of the cross falls across the world once more. Today in more than 60 nations in our world it is a crime to follow Christ. In our own land we are free to meet and to proclaim Jesus as the Anointed One of God and confess Him to be our Savior and Lord without fear of government reprisals, but this is not true for many followers of Christ today. In many nations around our world those who confess Christ are deprived of the equal justice and protection of the law. In still other lands those who heed the call of God's grace risk imprisonment, torture, slavery, or death. In this enlightened and civilized 21st century more Christians have been martyred for Christ than in all the nearly two thousand years of the history of Christ's Church combined.

There are those in the world and even in the Church who

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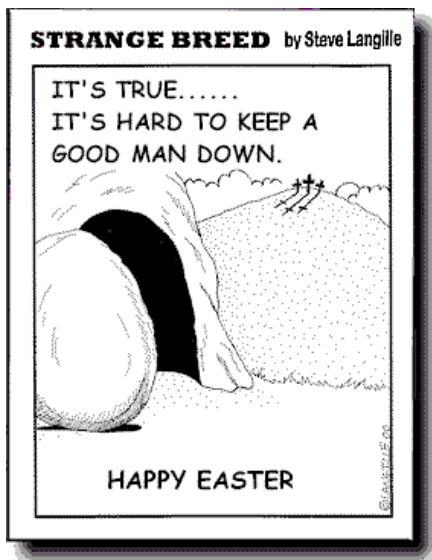
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look at the suffering of Christians and ask, "If God is truly a loving God, why does He not do something to help those who are even this day enduring imprisonment, enslavement, torture and even the pain of death in His name?" The answer is that He has done something: He has done everything. God Himself has gone to the cross to suffer and to die. The shadow of the cross does indeed lie upon the Church of our generation. For the shadow of the cross is the shadow of Christ Jesus—God Himself—stretched out upon the tree, arms extended to embrace you with the love of God ... for the shadow of the cross is not the shadow of death, but the shadow of life and the comfort of God's love.

In John 15:18-21, Jesus says that He has chosen us out of the world. By His grace, God has saved us and made us His servants. Our hope lies in the very thing that causes the persecution of the Church: the grace of God in Jesus Christ, by which God has worked salvation in us and made us His people.

As God says to us through Isaiah the prophet: **"Listen to Me, you who know righteousness, A people in whose heart is My law; Do not fear the reproach of man, Neither be dismayed at their revilings. For the moth will eat them like a garment, and the grub will eat them like wool. But My righteousness shall be forever, and My salvation to all generations." ... And I have put My words in your mouth, and have covered you with the shadow of My hand, to establish the heavens, to found the earth, and to say to Zion, "You are My people." (Isaiah 51:7-8; 16)**

God has covered us with the shadow of His hand. The cross does indeed cast its shadow over our generation, but we do not fear the shadow of the cross ... we glory in it. **How precious is Thy loving kindness, O God! And the children of men take refuge in the shadow of Thy wings. They drink their fill of the abundance of Thy house; and Thou dost give them to drink of the river of Thy delights. For with Thee is the fountain of life; In Thy light we see light. (Psalm 36:7-9)**
