Why Do We Go To Church

Why do we go to Church? Not 'why do we go to church on Saturday rather than another day' but 'why do we go at all?' There are many reasons why we go to church - some good, some bad, some in between. Last month we looked at two good reasons for why we should go to Church. The first reason was: We meet Christ in a special way in church. Celebrating the goodness of the Lord in the company of His people makes the music richer and the teaching fuller. God is present in a unique way in the gathering of His people and we cherish those moments with Him in the company of other believers. The second reason was that Church is where we find completeness. We don't all do the same jobs. But we are all important. We may not be the people in the spotlight but we matter. Our service is incomplete without the others. Their service is incomplete without us.

I will be covering one more reason this month for why it is important to go to church and to be a committed part of a church family but it is a big reason. Our involvement in a local church gives us the opportunity to demonstrate our love for God and it shows the world which side we're on in at least three ways. First we demonstrate our love for God by our commitment to weekly worship. We give our time to the things that are most

important to us. When we make our weekly meeting with God a priority in our schedule we demonstrate the Lord's importance in our lives. When that weekly time is regularly sidestepped, we also demonstrate the lack of the Lord's importance in our lives. A little old man was seen walking every week to church. He was deaf, so he could not hear a word of the sermon or the music of the choir, or the hymns sung by the congregation. A scoffer asked, "Why do you spend your days in that church when you can't hear a word?" He replied, "I want my neighbors to know which side I'm on!" Our commitment to weekly worship speaks volumes to a watching world . . . and our watching God.

Second we demonstrate our love for God by our service to each other. In Matthew 25, Jesus tells the famous story of the sheep and the goats. The way he separates the sheep from the goats is separating those who showed love to Him in practical ways and those who didn't. Speaking to the sheep, He said, "Then the King will say to those on His right, 'Come, you who are blessed of My Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world...;

"Then the righteous will answer Him, saying, 'Lord, when did we see You hungry, and feed You, or thirsty, and give You drink? 'And when did we see You a stranger, and invite You in, or naked, and clothe You? 'And when did we see You sick, or in prison, and come to You?' "And the King will answer and say to them, 'Truly I say to you, to the extent that you did it to one of these brothers of Mine, even the least of them, you did it to Me.' (Matthew 25:34, 37-40) Our service to others, our acts of kindness to others are acts of kindness to the Lord Himself and the Lord is paying attention. We learn the importance of performing acts of kindness in practical ways at church and have a wealth of people to

Third we demonstrate our love through our giving. In the book of Malachi, God asks a penetrating question: "Will a man rob God? Yet you are robbing Me! But you say, 'How have we robbed Thee?' In tithes and offerings. "You are cursed with a curse, for you are robbing Me, the whole nation of you! "Bring the whole tithe into the storehouse, so that there may be food in My house, and test Me now in this," says the Lord of hosts, "if I will not open for you the windows of heaven, and pour out for you a blessing until it overflows. (Malachi 3:8-10)

In this passage the people are charged with robbing God. Why? Because they are not giving God the 10% of their

income that He has said should be given to Him. He owns it all and He only wants 10%. And the 10% is to be given to the "storehouse", the temple . . . today the storehouse would be the church. Extra gifts are to go to extra places, but the tithe is to go to the church. The tithe enables the church to be sustained, ministries to be funded, missionaries to be supported, and needs to be met. Not only this, when we give God the first portion of our income, we prove our love to Him and "open the windows of blessing" from God.

Our checkbook says a great deal about our values. God is honored when we honor Him in our finances. What does our checkbook say about us when we: pay the cable bill, the Internet bill, the house payment, the car payment, buy new things for ourselves and our homes yet do not give God His ten percent? What does it say when we pay our bills but only TIP God?

The church gives us the opportunity to show our love for God in tangible ways through our attendance, our service and our giving. Remember the church is not a building . . . it is a people, who have been forever changed by God; who have joined together to bring honor and glory to the One they call Lord, Savior and King; who have come together by the power and leading of the Holy Spirit to be the arm and legs of Jesus. May God help our family grow and may He be honored in all that we do.
