"Trust in the LORD with all your heart and do not lean on your own understanding. In all your ways acknowledge Him, and He will make your paths straight." (Proverbs 3: 5-6)

Trust is mentioned over and over again in the Bible. In fact the Psalmist said "For you, O Lord, are my hope, my trust, O Lord, from my youth." (Psalm 71:5) Isaiah said, "Behold, God is my salvation, I will trust and not be afraid; For the Lord God is my strength and song, And He has become my salvation." (Isaiah 12: 2) Paul said, "... we both labor and suffer reproach, because we trust in the living God, who is the Savior of all men, especially of those who believe." (I Timothy 4: 10)

The word "trust" (according to the Webster's dictionary) means, "to put in the care of another, or believe." In the opening text above, Solomon is saying to us, "Trust in the Lord." We are to believe in Him but I think more importantly we are to put ourselves in the care of the

Lord, trusting that He will take care of us. I believe one of the hardest things that a person can do is put their trust in someone else. I can't think of any greater or more reliable person to put my trust in, than the Lord. In order for one to be trusted, one must first be found worthy of trust. Thank God that we have his Word to reflect upon. Let us just look at some of the many reasons why God is worthy of our trust.

The first thing that comes to my mind is Noah, who put his trust in God and survived the worst storm ever known to man. Moses put his trust in God and went through the Red Sea on dry land. Abraham trusted God and his son Isaac's life was spared. David trusted God and conquered the lion, the bear, Goliath and all of his enemies. The Apostle Paul trusted in the Lord and survived multiple beatings, stonings and shipwrecks. Jesus trusted God and suffered abuse, beatings, the crown of thorns, and

finally the cross and was resurrected on the third day and rose to heaven to sit at the right hand of God. In fact when Stephen was being stoned, Luke wrote, "But he, full of the Holy Spirit, gazed into heaven and saw the glory of God, and Jesus standing at the right hand of God. And he said, 'Behold, I see the heavens opened, and the Son of Man standing at the right hand of God." (Acts 7:55-56) God proves to us in His word time and time again, that He is worthy of our trust. I could go on and on. Scripture after Scripture proclaims that God is trustworthy. Each person who knows Him can attest to God's faithfulness.

Back to the words of our text, "Trust in the Lord with all of your heart, and lean not on your own understanding." When we trust in the Lord, we must trust with all of our heart, soul, mind and strength. Our Lord wants to see our humility. God wants us to know that without Him, we can do nothing. "I am the vine, you are the branches; he who abides in Me and I in him, he bears much fruit, for apart from Me you can do nothing." (John 15:5) We can not fully trust in Him, if

we are not willing to first acknowledge our weakness. We must surrender all effort to Him.

How many times do we try to handle our own situations; not wanting to admit our weaknesses. Just like an independent child, we carry the weight and burden because of our pride, instead of surrendering all effort to Him Who is able to do far above what we ask. We are sometimes like the little boy I heard about. He went to the candy store with his mother, and while he was there, he got his hand caught in the candy jar. He looked to his mother for help, and she told him to let go of the candy and he would be free. After he wrestled with the candy jar, trying to find a better way to be freed, he let go of the candy and his hand was freed.

Sometimes we want to try to find a better way to be free from our cares, and instead of trusting in the Lord, we lean on our own understanding. After wrestling, and analyzing our problem, we become weary and burdened. We must let go of our understanding, and trust in the Lord and His understanding. "The way of a fool is right in his own eyes:" (Proverbs 12:15) We deceive our own selves, when we try to solve our problems with only our understanding of the problem. God knows the ins and outs of every situation, every circumstance of life. God made us, He knows what makes us work. God desires that we walk in His ways because He knows what is best for us.

Blessed is the man who finds wisdom, the man who gains understanding. (Proverbs 3:13) God's wisdom and understanding is greater than we could ever fathom, but we must trust Him to lead our lives, even when we don't understand.

"As the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways and my thoughts than your thoughts." (Isaiah 55:9)
Thanks be to God that He does not leave us to the wisdom of our own minds but to the infinite care of His mind. We can trust in that.
