Good News and Good News

Cartoonist Johnny Hart came under a great deal of criticism for his "B.C." comic strip's Christian themes, especially for the 2001 strip that depicted a Jewish menorah being transformed into a Christian cross as the "seven last Words" of Jesus on the cross appear under each pane. It was a powerful statement, one that many people protested. They campaigned to get it removed from many newspapers because of its so-called "lack of respect" for the Jewish faith.

What was the big deal? It's simple. As Christians, we believe that Jesus' resurrection is the focal point of history and the world does not. We picture history as a linear timeline with the cross at the center. The Bible tells us that every moment from Creation on had been leading up to the cross and that every moment since the cross is lived in light of Jesus' death and resurrection. It's very clear to us but an offense to the world.

Max Lucado writes, "The cross. It rests on the time

line of history like a compelling diamond. Its tragedy summons all sufferers. Its absurdity attracts all cynics. Its hope lures all searchers... History has idolized it and despised it, gold-plated it and burned it, worn and trashed it. History has done everything to it but ignore it. That's the one option that the cross does not offer. No one can ignore it! You can't ignore a piece of lumber that suspends the greatest claim in history. Its bottom line is sobering: ...if the account is true, it is history's hinge. Period. ... If not, it is history's hoax. That's why the cross is what matters." (From "No Wonder They Call Him The Savior")

Paul makes the centrality of the Cross and the empty Tomb clear in 1Corinthians when he said, "Now I make known to you, brethren, the gospel which I preached to you, which also you received, in which also you stand, by which also you are saved, if you hold fast

the word which I preached to you, unless you believed in vain. For I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received, that Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures, and that He was buried, and that He was raised on the third day according to the Scriptures," (1Corinthians 15:1-4)

He tells them that the Gospel he preached to them, that they received, that they stood upon and by which they are saved is simply this: Jesus died for their sins; was buried and rose from the dead on the third day and that this was all according to the Scriptures.

Going further, Paul declares the consequence if Jesus was not resurrected from the dead. "And if Christ has not been raised, your faith is futile and you are still in your sins. Then those also who have fallen asleep in Christ have perished. If in this life only we have hoped in Christ, we are of all people most to be pitied. But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead. the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep." (1Corinthians 15:17-20)

If Jesus' resurrection is truly the focal point of history... then you have a

choice to make: Believe in Jesus, or dismiss Him? Accept His claims, or reject Him? There is no middle ground! Either you submit to Jesus, live under his daily direction, and receive the benefits of Jesus' death and resurrection or you deny Him and live only for yourself and under your own power. You have to make a choice! You cannot remain neutral! Too often people think Heaven is the default position. Everyone is going to Heaven unless they really mess up, like a Judas or a Hitler. The truth is the default position for mankind is Hell. Everyone is going to Hell unless they make a choice to trust Jesus and follow Him.

Let's take a look at another "B.C." cartoon where Johnny Hart depicts three men talking: 1st man, "Would you lay down your life for someone else?"

2nd man, "That would be pretty stupid."
3rd man, "Yeah, why would we do that?"
1st man, "What if you loved someone so much, you would give your life for them?"

2nd man, "... You mean, like, would we die in their place?"

3rd man, "...So they wouldn't have to?" 1st man, "BINGO!"

2nd man, "Nobody has that much love!" 3rd man, "And if anyone did, I'd sure hate to lose him!"

Overhearing their conversation, a fourth man appears and says: "Well, guys. I've got Good News and Good News." The good news is that He did lay down His life for us and the good news is that He's still alive and is making intercession even now for us in heaven at the right hand of the Father!

If you have made the choice to follow Jesus, I want to encourage you to live your life in light of Jesus' death and resurrection! Let God speak to you in His Word. Speak to God in prayer. Get involved in Worship and Fellowship regularly. Share God's love with those around you. Finally, make your life a celebration of all God has done for you!



5 finger prayer
