How Not To Sin 2

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To refresh readers' minds, I said last month that the way not to sin is to *choose* not to sin. Easy, right? No, the truth is, it is hard to just stop doing something. The only way it is possible is if we take positive steps to fill the void that stopping leaves. I think a little advice from the Apostle Paul from Romans 13 might help. If we want to learn how not to sin we must understand that we need to:

First: Pay up the love that we owe to one another. **"Owe no one anything, except to love each other, for the one who loves another has fulfilled the law. For the commandments, 'You shall not commit adultery, You shall not murder, You shall not steal, You shall not covet,' and any other commandment, are summed up in this word: 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' Love does no wrong to a neighbor; therefore love is the fulfilling of the law." (Romans 13:8-10 ESV)** Love fulfills the law because love from the heart helps us to obey what the law demands.

A husband does not labor all day because the law tells him to support his family. He labors because he loves them and wants to provide for them. Where there is love there will be no murder, dishonesty, stealing, or other kinds of selfishness. Where there is love there is no sin.

Second: Wake up. **"Besides this you know the time, that the hour has come for you to wake from sleep. . . " (Romans 13:11 ESV)** Sleep may be either a blessing or a curse. By it the body is restored and the spirit refreshed. Sleep can also be a curse. When a person just stays in bed, it is an expression of laziness. Similarly today I fear that God's people are too often asleep. Asleep, we are unaware of the urgency of our world's needs: the hungry to be fed, peace to be made, the ignorant to be taught, the lost to be saved. Asleep, we are unconscious of our potential and our call to meet those needs. Asleep we are inactive in God's work and uninvolved in what He is doing. Asleep we lag behind others who peddle their false-solutions, quack cures, and half-truths. It is

time to wake up and do what the Lord requires, wrapped as an expression of love. If you do that there will not be time for sin.

Third: Wise up. **". . . For salvation is nearer to us now than when we first believed." (Romans 13:11 ESV)** Have you ever wondered why the right-hand door mirror on your car says "Objects are closer than they appear"? The reason is that the mirror is convex, allowing a much wider angle of vision. We may borrow the words, though, and say that the Second Coming may be much closer than it appears. That knowledge alone gives us a wider field of vision in this lost world! The nearness of our salvation should cause us to act with informed urgency and take the next step which is to . . .

Four: Get up. **12 The night is far gone; the day is at hand. So then let us cast off the works of darkness and put on the armor of light. 13 Let us walk properly as in the daytime, not in orgies and drunkenness, not in sexual immorality and sensuality, not in quarreling and jealousy. (Romans 13:12-13 ESV)** When you get up from bed you take off your sleeping attire and put on your working clothes. We are to cast off the works of darkness, and put on the armor of light. We are to strip off the darkness of this world and wrap ourselves in the light of Christ. The night is often symbolic of darkness, evil, and sin. It is under a cover of

darkness that evil deeds are often done. Praise God that the night is over for us. That time in our lives is passing. It is fading. The day is dawning. Therefore, it is time to get rid of the habits, behaviors, and lifestyle that we used to live and clothe ourselves in the armor of light. Take off lying and put on integrity. Take off stealing and put on charity. Take off sexual immorality and put on purity. Take off foul language and put on encouragement. Take off anger and put on love. Take off pride and put on humility. Take off anything that stands between you and God and put on a close, personal, meaningful relationship with Jesus Christ. Live your life with real meaning and purpose, and expectation of the day when you will see Him face to face. Do you want to be embroiled in sin when Jesus comes? I don't think so.

Five: Dress up. **"But put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires."** (Romans 13:14 ESV) First of all, what does it mean to **"But put on the Lord Jesus Christ?"**

There's really nothing to it. We don't have to sew our own booties or stitch our own shirts that say "Christ" on them. For Paul explains in **"For as many of you as were baptized into Christ have put on Christ."** (Galatians 3:27) We put on Christ at our baptism but we must also 'put on' Christ, as a continuing process in which we become more and more like Jesus every day. So, the longer we know Him the more we begin to look like Him in every aspect of our lives. It's kind of like it is with our children. The older they get the more they look and act like their parents. Putting on Jesus is just a matter of continuing to have faith in Jesus and the work Jesus is doing in our lives. This clothing is not itchy - like wool. It is not heavy - like the law. It isn't too big or too small. It keeps the heat of God's wrath out and protects our hearts from getting cold. It is the most comfortable clothing you could wear. People see our clothing, very seldom what is under it. If we keep putting on Jesus, people will see Jesus when they see us. If we are becoming more like Jesus, we will find ourselves sinning less and less

Six: Clean up ". . . **make no provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires."** (Romans 13:14 ESV) This means to leave no loopholes in your life and to close all the exits. If your weakness is drinking alcohol, you'll never clean up by keeping a can of beer in your refrigerator (just in case). If your weakness is internet pornography, you'll never kick the habit by leaving the filter off on your computer (just in case). If God reveals to you that you have a bad attitude, you'll never overcome it if you keep company with those "friends" who display the same bad attitude. Don't give yourself an avenue for sin.

Are you ready not to sin? Join me. It's time to stop pushing the snooze button in our Christian lives. It's time to pay up, wake up, wise up, get up, dress up and clean up.
