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Dead, Risen and Hidden

Have you ever noticed how earthly minded we are? This should not be surprising. After all, we are earth dwellers. We live on this planet at a certain time and in a certain place. We are physical beings in a physical world. It's natural for us to think about our jobs, our material possessions, our finances, our health, and the people who are important to us. We live in the dimensions of time and space, and we must function in this natural world by the physical principles that define it. However, those physical principles should not define us.

In Colossians 3, the apostle Paul reminds us of who we are in Christ and of how important it is to see ourselves from that perspective. He shows us that how we live our lives on earth depends on our having a heavenly perspective. So many Christians do not understand exactly who they are in Christ. Our understanding, obviously, must come from the Bible. In other words, we are who God says we are and we have what God says we have. His word is the determining factor, not our feelings or what someone else has said about us. The infallible word of God tells us the truth about us. The truth that I want us to see is that, in Christ, we are already dead, risen and hidden. This month I will be writing about those parts of the passage that are underlined, next month I will examine other parts of the passage. Colossians 3: ¹ If then you have been raised with Christ, seek the things that are above, where Christ is. seated at the right hand of God.² Set your minds on things that are above, not on things that are on earth. ³ For you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God. ⁴ When Christ who is your life appears, then you also will appear with him in alory.

The word "if" does not suggest that Paul's readers might not have been "risen with Christ", for all believers, are identified with Christ in death, burial, resurrection, and ascension. The word "since" gives the truer meaning of the word. Since <u>you have been raised</u> <u>with Christ</u>, our exalted position in Christ is not a hypothetical thing or a goal for which we strive. It is an accomplished fact in Christ.

Our text tells us that three important things have happened to us--we died, we rose from the dead and our life is hidden with Christ. But how can this be? According to the Scripture, if we've given our life to Jesus Christ, when Christ died on the cross for our sin, we died there with Him. We were then resurrected--given a new eternal life not tainted by sin. We died to sin We have been set free from the penalty of sin and the power of sin. In theological terms, this is called the 'substitutionary atoning death of Christ'. Then, when He rose from the dead, we rose with Him. Because of his resurrection, we have been raised to a new life of the Spirit. The Bible calls this 'being born again'. We have been born from above by the power of the Spirit to live an abundant life in a new spiritual dimension. According to our text, we dwell spiritually with Christ in a heavenly realm. Our old self has been put to

Page 2 death and our new self has been made alive. We are now a new creation in Christ. It is not

are now a new creation in Christ. It is not necessary for us to understand how it happens or figure out how to make it happen. We must just believe it is true and it has been accomplished by Jesus.

The exciting truth here is that we have been united with Christ. We are identified with Him and Him with us. As Christians, we should never see ourselves apart from Christ. Our lives are hidden with Christ in God. We are thoroughly identified with Christ. He is our life. We are one with Him. We dwell with Him. We're not simply earth dwellers. We are heaven dwellers.

We no longer belong to the world, but to Christ; and the sources of life that we enjoy come only from Him. The Christian life is a "hidden life" as far as the world is concerned, because the world does not know Christ. Our sphere of life is not this earth, but heaven; and the things that should attract us and excite us belong to heaven, not to earth. This does not mean that we should ignore our earthly responsibilities. Rather it means that our motives and our strength come from heaven, not earth. It doesn't mean that you simply don't know the world around you even exists so you guit your job and lay on the couch all day. It means that the things that should be important to you are the things that involve your heavenly citizenship not your earthly.

Now, it is easy to say these things. It's harder to see them and it is even harder to walk in them. But we must see them, even though we may be dealing with all of the problems we face in this physical world. You see, that is the point of it all. The point is that if I see this new reality, it will change how I feel about my current reality. If I see myself as dwelling with Christ, it makes all the difference in how I deal with the affairs of this life. It makes all the difference in how I see myself and where my self worth is found. That is why Paul reminds us that we have a new identity in Christ and we should never see ourselves apart from Him. We can take courage from that and find joy in that for sure!
