## Our Name: Church of the Lord Our Righteousness

Our church name tells you almost everything that you really need to know about our church. We firmly believe that we have no righteousness apart from what we receive by faith through Jesus Christ our Lord. Some people think that we are legalistic because we worship on Saturday. The fact is, we keep the Sabbath commandment, just like the rest of the orthodox Christian world keep all the other commandments imperfectly, even the commandment such as "You shall not kill". We understand that Isaiah's declaration applies to all of us, the best and the worst, "All of us have become like one who is unclean, and all our righteous acts are like filthy rags; (Isaiah 64: 6) Isaiah isn't calling our sin or our depravities "filthy rags" but "our righteous acts". He is talking about the things that we do that are good, that would earn us a gold star or an "A" on anybody else's report card. On God's report card, He says they "are like filthy rags". What do we do with filthy rags? We might try to

wash them but we know filthy rags never come completely clean. Our best efforts are never pure or clean; they are always tainted by pride or some level of self interest so they are never clean enough. We usually just throw filthy rags away. As far as salvation is concerned that is what we must do with our righteous acts because no matter how good they are or how good we think we are, we will never be good enough to save ourselves. Being good is just not good enough.

Being a Pastor, I have been to a lot of funerals. Perhaps you have noticed like I have that it seems that everybody is going to heaven. Conventional wisdom seems to lead some to believe that no matter how bad the person was, unless they were a devout atheist or a child killer, they will go to heaven and certainly, the more good things a person does, the more certain that outcome will be. It would be

something to fervently hope for, that everyone would be saved, but the truth is, the default position in death is not heaven but hell and it is not everlasting life but the second death. So we must find a way so that we can go to heaven.

To do that we must echo Paul's words in Philippians "Yet indeed I also count all things loss for the excellence of the knowledge of Christ Jesus my Lord, for whom I have suffered the loss of all things, and count them as rubbish, that I may gain Christ and be found in Him, *not having my own righteousness, which is from the law, but that which is through faith in Christ, the righteousness which is from God by faith;*" (Philippians 3: 8-9) We must count all our righteous acts as the filthy rags that they are and by faith accept the righteousness that comes from God through faith in Christ.

The following two passages from Jeremiah gives us the Biblical basis for the name of our church, "Behold, *the days are coming,*" says the LORD, "That I will raise to David a Branch of righteousness; A King shall reign and prosper, And execute judgment and

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righteousness in the earth. 6 In His days Judah will be saved, And Israel will dwell safely; Now this *is* His name by which He will be called: THE LORD OUR RIGHTEOUSNESS." (Jeremiah 23: 5-6) The emphasis here is that the righteous branch is called "THE LORD OUR RIGHTEOUSNESS"

Jeremiah 33: 15-16 offers very similar language when it says, "In those days and at that time I will cause to grow up to David A Branch of righteousness; He shall execute judgment and righteousness in the earth. In those days Judah will be saved, And Jerusalem will dwell safely. And this *is the name* by which she will be called: THE LORD OUR RIGHTEOUSNESS." The emphasis here is that the reign of the righteous branch will bring righteousness to His people so that she is called "THE LORD OUR RIGHTEOUSNESS."

We believe that Jesus Christ is our righteousness. When Jeremiah spoke of "A Branch of righteousness" from the line of David, he was pointing to Jesus who is THE LORD OUR RIGHTEOUSNESS and to a people of God that can claim that name, THE LORD OUR RIGHTEOUSNESS.

This exalted name applies only to Jesus Christ and His people. According to Paul, "Now all things *are of God*, who has reconciled us to Himself through Jesus Christ . . . For He (God) made Him (Jesus) who knew no sin *to be sin* for us, that we might become the righteousness of God in Him. (2 Corinthians 5:18, 21) When we put our faith in Jesus Christ, His righteousness is put into our account and we are declared righteous before God. What a joy it is to know that God has given us His righteousness. So that it is not about what we do whether good or bad, pure or evil, but what we believe in our heart about Jesus. Do we hang on to our righteous acts and claim that they can save us or do we cling to Jesus who died on the cross for our sin so that we can have everlasting life? Do what is truly a righteous act and trust in Jesus for life everlasting so that when you die, we can all say, "See you later", as members of the universal Church of the Lord Our Righteousness.

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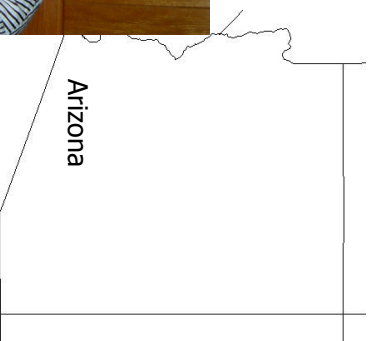


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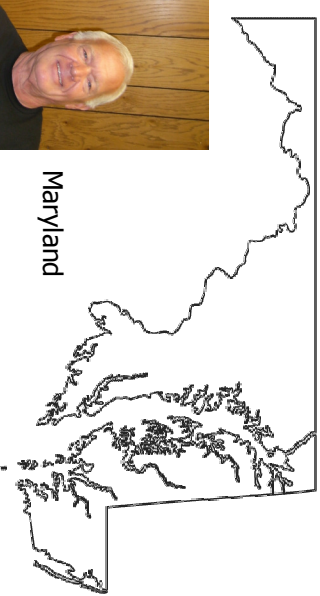


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
