Expressing Our Love for God through Obedience

We have for the past few months examined some of the ways that we express our love for God. God tells us He wants us to love Him with all of our heart, with all of our soul. with all of our mind, and all of our strength. This month we will examine the expression of our love for God through obedience to His commands. Our obedience reveals our true love for God as Jesus said, "If you love Me, you will keep My commandments. (John 14:15)

Obedience then is the litmus test of our love of God. What is a litmus test? If you had chemistry in school, you used a colored litmus paper to determine how acidic something was, or its 'PH value'. If you have a swimming pool you know what I am talking about as well. When it turned a certain color you knew approximately how acidic the water was. The litmus test for our love for God is not how we feel about God or our affection for God. The litmus test for our love is measured by our obedience. Are we obeying his commands, following his teachings, doing

what He tells us to do? Everything else is just giving God lip service. Anyone can say they love God, but the proof is when we obey God.

Notice, we obey God's commands because we love God. The reverse never works; we can't obey our way into a love for God. In other words, just as Martin Luther and John and Charles Wesley learned for themselves, I can't make myself love God more by following God's commands. Those three men were clergyman and they tried to do all the right things. They tried to follow every commandment and every church teaching, but instead of experiencing God's love and grace, they were empty inside. Luther was even angry and bitter over how miserable his life was in trying to follow all of God's rules and regulations. It wasn't until each man was awakened to the incredible love God had for them in Jesus Christ that they were set free from the law so that they

might freely love God. Once they were in a loving relationship with God, they longed to follow God's commands. Unless your obedience flows out of your love for God, it isn't true obedience

If you have kids, have had kids, baby sat kids, or observed kids, you know that parents ask their kids to do things. When they ask their kids to do something, what do they expect? They expect their kids to do what they're asked to do. Silly parents, I know! Kids may do what they're asked for several reasons. Some are motivated by a fear of punishment. They are afraid of being grounded, given time out, or deprived of an outing. Some are motivated by a desire for rewards. Maybe their allowance is tied to whatever they are being asked to do. Some are motivated by guilt. They feel guilty if they let their parents down. Some are motivated by the love they have for their parents and they want to please them. I know this doesn't happen that way very often and, when it does, what a thrill it is! I know that as a parent we need every weapon in our arsenal to mold our kids into decent human beings, but it is obvious that love is the

best motivation. When our children do it for love, it's as if we recognize that they have achieved something truly great in their development, and in fact, they have.

In our relationship with God we can be motivated by fear (hell, punishment), reward (heaven, crown of righteousness) or guilt ('you sinner'). But know this, God desires for us to be motivated by our love for Him.

Frederick Buechner's little book of character sketches of people from the Bible has this to say about the angel Gabriel as he encounters Mary: "She struck him as hardly old enough to have a child at all, let alone this child. But he had been entrusted with a message to give her, and he gave it. He told her what the child was to be named, who he was to be, and something about the mystery that was to come upon her. 'You mustn't be afraid, Mary,' he said. As he said it, he only hoped she wouldn't notice that beneath the great golden wings, he himself was trembling with fear to think that the whole future of creation hung on the answer of a girl."

Gabriel's obedience to the Father God was unconditional. But what would Mary's response to God be? We all know that Mary was willing to accept her role in God's great plan to bring salvation to the world, but what about her motivation for obedience?

Mary could have chosen to obey God's plan for her life because she wanted the special reward of God's favor upon her because of her faithfulness to God. If so, the Holy Spirit could have seen this motive and passed her by to find someone else to be the Mother to the Messiah.

Mary could have been fearful that God would punish her if she refused, so she anxiously accepted the role God assigned to her lest God strike her dead. Would the Holy Spirit entrust the Christ child to an individual with such a view of God? God wasn't sending a Messiah to pour out His wrath upon disobedient sinners but to display His love for them in spite of their sin.

Mary could have felt she had no choice other than to impose a strict self-righteousness upon herself to carefully obey God and His law. The Holy Spirit would see Mary's righteousness as nothing more than filthy rags. Would God place His Son into the care of a self-righteous legalist when the Messiah's purpose would be to set man free from the condemnation of the law?

God had chosen wisely in selecting Mary to be the Mother of the Messiah. She lovingly obeyed God's purpose and plan for her life. "Behold, the bondslave of the Lord; may it be done to me according to your word." And the angel departed from her. (Luke 1:38) was Mary's simple response.

What's your motivation for obedience to Christ's command? Love is proven genuine through obedience. May you be a willing servant who responds with obedience because of your great love for your Master.




