As many of you might know, I love movies. I was surfing the other night for a movie and I landed on the movie "City Slickers" as it played one of the movie's classic scenes. John Ortberg describes the scene this way. "Billy Crystal plays a confused, dissatisfied thirty-something character with a vague sense that life is passing him by. Jack Palance—ancient, leathery, wise to the ways of the world (a saddlebag with eyes)—asks Crystal if he would like to know the secret of life. 'It's this,' holding up a single finger. 'The secret of life is your finger?' asks Crystal. 'It's one thing,' Palance replies. The secret of life is pursuing one thing.' Somehow this resonates with Billy Crystal's character. His life is scattered. He is torn between his obligation to his family and his desire for career advancement; between his need for

security and his need for excitement. He is divided somehow. His life is about many things and so he senses, it is about nothing. So what is the one thing? Jack Palance can't tell Billy Crystal. 'You have to find it for yourself.'"

As Christians we have some definite ideas on where to look for that one thing. Paul gives us some advice in **Philippians 3: 13 . . . but one thing I do: forgetting what *lies* behind and reaching forward to what *lies* ahead,** "But one thing I do" Paul learned one of the secrets of moving on is concentration! He's saying I'm going to give my life to one thing of value and purpose!

You may be asking yourself, "What was the one thing Paul did?" **Philippians 3: 14 I press on toward the goal for the prize of**

the upward call of God in Christ Jesus. So Paul says I've got one thing in sight - I'm reaching for the goal in this life and the prize in the next life! This is the secret to purpose!

You can think of it this way. Take a huge river running freely through the land. If you dam it up you have now turned that river into something very powerful for the use of energy! But if that river overflows the banks, all you get is a swamp! You could say that our lives are a lot like a river with two great banks on each side, with the banks being made up of God's will and God's work in our lives. Sometimes instead of being that person who submits to God's will and work in our lives, our lives spill over the banks, turning our lives into a swamp! That is not God's will for our life!

Paul is saying that 'my life is in a full court press!' in accord with God's will. If you are in a place where you are saying, "I'm not where I want to be" - then press on! You may be

saying, "I'm discouraged in my marriage" - then press on! You may be saying, "I'm tired of my job" - then press on! You may be saying, "I've been abused most of my life" -then press on!

It will take more than aspiration, inspiration and perspiration - it takes determination! My generation, the Baby Boomer Generation struggles with determination! I agree that my Dad's generation, as Tom Brokaw says, is the "greatest generation"!

Lou Holtz once said, "If you don't make a total commitment to whatever you are doing then you start looking to bail out the first time the boats starts to leak. It's tough enough getting the boat to shore with everyone rowing, let alone when a guy stands up and starts putting his life jacket on."

When life delivers hard blows---we need determination to fight back. When life dumps trouble on our doorstep - we need determination to shovel it away. When life destroys our dreams - we need determination to believe for new ones!

Because of the mercy of God, the grace of God and the forgiveness of God - it doesn't matter where you've been! What matters the most today is not where you've come from, but where you're going and do you have determination to get there?

Failure is never fatal; you could say that failure is never a person in life, but a place in life! Let's get past that place in 2011! Remember that you are child of God so press on! Remember that the creator of heaven and earth loves you so press on! Remember that Jesus the Christ died for you so press on! Winston Churchill echoes Paul's thought when he said, "Success is not final, failure is not fatal: it is the courage to continue that counts."
