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How is your love life?

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Check out the website Colornet.org Someone once said that if you ever want to know the truth about something then you should ask children. The following is what love means to some children and what they think love is.

Glenn, age 7 - "If falling in love is anything like learning how to spell, I don't want to do it. It takes too long." (He's right, loving people takes a long time. It takes a lifetime.) Kenny, age 7 - "It gives me a headache to think about that stuff. I'm just a kid. I don't need that kind of trouble". Regina, age 10 - "I'm not rushing into love. I'm finding fourth grade hard enough". Dave, age 8 - "Love will find you, even if you are trying to hide from it. I've been trying to hide from it since I was five, but the girls keep finding me". Manuel, age 8 - "I think you're supposed to get shot with an arrow or something, but the rest of it isn't supposed to be painful".

If you love, there will be pain. So I'll ask you the question, "How is your love life?" Paul is clear your love life is supposed to be greater than your spirituality. 1 Corinthians 13:1: If I speak in the tongues of men and of angels, but have not love, I am only a resounding gong or a clanging cymbal. 2 If I have the gift of prophecy and can fathom all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have a faith that can move mountains, but have not love, I am nothing. 3 If I give all I possess to the poor and surrender my body to the flames, but have not love, I gain nothing.

Your love life is supposed to look like this: 1 Corinthians 13:4, "Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. 5 It is not rude, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. 6 Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. 7 It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres. 8 Love never fails."

This paragraph sets a standard that no one can meet, no one that is except Jesus. Rather than let this scripture remind us of a love we cannot produce, let it remind us of a love we cannot resist - God's love. You probably already know that loving people isn't

easy. The vow breakers, truth benders, the money grubbers and backstabbers we meet, work with, and marry. How do we love someone who is hard to love? What's our typical strategy for treating a troubled relationship? Try harder. So we try. Teeth clenched. Jaw firm. Conventional wisdom says that a lack of love implies a lack of effort, so we dig deeper, strain more. We're going to love if it kills us! And it may do just that. 1 John 4: 9: This is how God showed his love among us: He sent his one and only Son into the world that we might live through him. 10 This is love: not that we loved God. but that he loved us and sent his Son as an atoning sacrifice for our sins. 11 Dear friends, since God so loved us, we also ought to love one another.

Notice something in this passage. The Apostle John spends three sentences telling us how much God loves us. Then he takes just one sentence to say that since God loves us, we ought to love others. It's a 3 to 1 ratio of where our energy should be if we're to love effectively. God never tells us to love without telling us we are loved and He even gives us the love which He wants us to lavish on the world for Him. Romans 5:5 Now hope does not disappoint, because the love of God has been poured out in our hearts by the Holy Spirit who was given to us. When we reach for the sponge that we use to wipe off the counter, the first thing we do is get the sponge wet, because the crispy, crusty hard and brittle sponge can't be used for anything until we get it wet. People come with crusty and hard hearts. Take that hard heart and try to love somebody with that heart - it is impossible. We need to try to add the moisture of God's love, to be immersed into God's grace and forgiveness. And then, that heart changes. It becomes moist and useable and it really becomes a tool that God can use to love others.

Jerome, the Church historian, relates of the Apostle John that, when he became old he used to go among the churches everywhere repeating the words, "Little children, love one another." His disciples, wearied by the constant repetition, asked him why he always said this, "Because," he replied, "it is the Lord's commandment; and if it only be fulfilled, it is enough." How? By receiving God's love, relying on God's love, living God's love. We know that we have to love more like Jesus but it is hard. Jesus gave us an example to follow. 1 John 3:16 By this we know love, because He laid down His life for us. And we also ought to lay down our lives for the brethren.

Love is greater than Spirituality so don't tell me how much money you give or how much you pray or how many times you read through the Bible in a year or how often you go on mission trips. Tell me how much you love. Better yet show me, because that is what Jesus has told us to do.

In the coming months I'm going be talking about the "one anothers" in the Bible. The commands of Scripture on how we are supposed to love one another, not just the believers in our local churches but believers of all kinds, everywhere. Some examples of Scripture of how we show our love is by: laying down our lives for one another (1 John 3:16) serving one another (Gal. 5:13), praying for one another (James 5:16), confessing our faults to one another (James 5:16), exhorting one another (Heb. 3:13), admonishing one another (Rom. 15:14), building one another up (1 Thess. 5:11), comforting one another (2 Cor. 1:3-6), forbearing one another (Col. 3:13), bearing one another's burdens (Gal. 6:2), forgiving one another (Eph. 4:32, provoking one another to love and good deeds, (Heb. 10:24),

I hope you agree that this will give us much to chew on but also much to apply in our lives.

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The month of February has flown by—busyness and being a couple days short helped its speed I guess.
