One of the more popular TV game shows is The Price Is Right which was hosted by good old Bob Barker for decades, but is now hosted by Drew Carey. Competing on The Price Is Right begins when the announcer calls a contestant's name and calls out "Come on down!"

This was Isaiah's desire...... his hope was that God would come down and show Himself in power. "Oh, that You would rend the heavens and come down, That the mountains might quake at Your presence." (Isaiah 64:1). This hope is also our hope--- our only hope in fact that was satisfied in Jesus.

Christmas is a time of expectation, anticipation, and preparation to celebrate the fact that Jesus came down into this world 2,000 years ago... that Jesus has come into the hearts of those who believe and has caused us to become new creations... children of God... ...and that Jesus will come back again and usher in God's kingdom in all its fullness! These are three advents, or 'coming downs' of Christ: Immanuel-God with us in the flesh, the coming of Jesus into our hearts and the

coming of Jesus in glory. Know this too – that our hope resides in a Person and not in a movement, not in a political party, not in a country, not in a new age, but the person of Jesus. He has come down for you and me.

I like this story about two Americans who in 1994 answered an invitation from the Russian Department of Education to teach morals and ethics (based on Biblical principles) in the public schools. They were invited to teach at prisons, businesses, the fire and police departments, and a large orphanage.

It was nearing the holiday season when the orphans heard for the first time the traditional Christmas story. The Americans told them about Mary and Joseph arriving in Bethlehem and, finding no room in the inn, the couple went to a stable, where Jesus was born and placed in the manger. Throughout the story, the children, according to one of the Americans, "sat in amazement as they

listened. Some sat on the edges of their stools, trying to grasp every word."

As a follow-up activity to the story, each child was given three small pieces of cardboard to make a crude manager and yellow strips of paper for the manger straw. Small squares of flannel from a thrown away nightgown were used for the baby's blanket while a doll-like baby was made from pieces of tan felt. As the Americans made their way around the room to observe the children, this is what one of the Americans noted,

"All went well until I got to one table where little Misha sat. He looked to be about 6 years old and had finished his project. As I looked at the little boy's manger, I was startled to see, not one but two babies in the manger. Quickly, I called for the translator to ask the lad why there were two babies in the manger." Misha very accurately recalled the story that had been told until he came to the part where Mary put Jesus in the manger. Then Misha, started to ad-lib. He made up his own ending to the story as he said, "And when Maria laid the baby in the manger, Jesus looked at me

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and asked me if I had a place to stay. I told him I have no momma and I have no papa, so I don't have any place to stay. Then Jesus told me I could stay with him. But I told him I couldn't because I didn't have a gift to give him like everybody else did. But I wanted to stay with Jesus so much, so I thought about what I had that maybe I could use for a gift. I thought maybe if I kept him warm, that would be a good gift. So I asked Jesus, 'If I keep you warm, will that be a good enough gift?' And Jesus told me, 'If you keep me warm, that will be the best gift anybody ever gave me'. So I got into the manger, and then Jesus looked at me and he told me I could stay with him -' for always.' As little Misha finished his story, his eyes brimmed full of tears that splashed down his little cheeks. Putting his hand over his face, his head dropped to the table and his shoulders shook as he sobbed and sobbed. The little orphan had found someone who would never abandon or abuse him, someone who would stay with him - for always!"

My prayer is that we would recognize our need for Him as this little boy did and that our hearts would be as desperate to be found by and loved by Jesus Christ, Emmanuel, the One Who is God with us and Who is God in us and God Who is coming back again for us. May He receive all glory and honor and praise!
