

Overcoming Sin

I was talking to someone about addiction and I told them about my own problem with alcohol. I began with the fact that my whole social life was centered on the consumption of beer. I never went anywhere unless I could drink. I rarely went to weddings but I always went to the receptions so that I could party for free.

God changed that, not all at once, but still miraculously. God changed my thinking about drinking. Everything that I thought drinking did for me, He showed me was a lie. God also showed me the consequences of my drinking - not just the hangovers and the regrets about what I did or said while I was drunk, but how I hurt people and how drinking was my god.

When I turned to the true God through His son Jesus, God slowly loosened my grip on the beer bottle until after a wedding in which I consumed a relatively small amount of alcohol, I just gave it up and let it go, never to return it as my god again.

I also told this person that on the other hand I still struggled with certain sins, day after day, month after month, year after year.

Maybe you have had the same experience, in which the big obstacles to your ability to have a relationship with God have been removed but where seemingly little things get in your way of having a deeper and growing relationship with God. This has often puzzled me and it puzzled me again after talking to this person.

I gained some insight into this problem after we completed a study in the book of Joshua, In Joshua, it describes how Israel took possession of the land that God had promised Abraham. Joshua describes battle after battle where God goes with them, defeats their enemies one after another. "Now Joshua was old and advanced in years when the LORD said to him. "You are old and advanced in years, and very much of the land remains to be possessed." (Joshua 13:1).

They had fought many battles and the Lord had been with them but the land stilled needed to be possessed, not just conquered. The really difficult battles had been won and now the mopping up work

still remained. Thankfully, the Lord promised to be with them for that. "...I will drive them out from before the sons of Israel" (Joshua 13:6). The story then goes on to describe how The land was divided between the tribes of Israel. "So the LORD gave Israel all the land which He had sworn to give to their fathers, and they possessed it and lived in it. And the LORD gave them rest on every side, according to all that He had sworn to their fathers, and no one of all their enemies stood before them; the LORD gave all their enemies into their hand. Not one of the good promises which the LORD had made to the house of Israel failed; all came to pass." (Joshua 21:43-45).

The Lord is faithful to keep His promises to His people at all times and in all ways. At this time of year in which we celebrate the keeping of God's greatest promise of all, the sending of the Messiah, a Savior of the world, we know that He is faithful. Jesus did not just come to us as a little baby but He grew to

But towards the end of his life, Joshua warned the Israelites in Joshua 22:5 "Only be very careful to observe the commandment and the law which Moses the servant of the LORD commanded you, to love the LORD your God and walk in all His ways and keep His commandments and hold fast to Him and serve Him with all your heart and with all your soul.

"So take diligent heed to yourselves to love the LORD your God." (Joshua 23:11). God had done everything that He said He would do, He had brought them into a land that they could possess and He had given them each an inheritance in that land and yet they failed to fully possess the land.

You may be discouraged about yourself in your walk with the Lord. You may see those stubborn sins that you have not been able to break loose from. He has paid the penalty for your sin already. It has been dealt with in God's presence. Do your best not to sin. But when you sin, and you will, take it to God and ask for His forgiveness. Ask Him to help the people your sin has harmed. Know that just like God's people failed to win total victory over the land of Israel, He remained with them. He sent them a Savior. He has won the victory over sin and death for us all.
