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What to do with freedom

Perhaps you can relate to the following statement by Hewitt. "Everybody looks for different things in the Ten Commandments. Some look for Divine guidance, some look for a code to live by, but most of us are looking for loopholes." Regardless, many of us are prone to go to extremes when we look at them. One believer interprets liberty as license and thinks he can do whatever he wants to do. Another believer, seeing this error, goes to an opposite extreme and imposes Law on everybody. Somewhere between license on the one hand and legalism on the other hand is true Christian liberty.

When a person gives their life to Jesus do you think the world thinks that they are free? Or does the world think that a Christian's life is about a lot of do's and don'ts with the don'ts far out weighing the do's? Galatians 5:1 tells us we are called to freedom. **It was for freedom that Christ set us free; therefore keep standing firm and do not be subject again to a yoke of slavery.** Our call authorizes believers to lay claim to their

freedom and it challenges believers to use their freedom responsibly. The Christian is a free person. He is free from the guilt of sin because he has experienced God's forgiveness. He is free from the penalty of sin because Christ died for him on the cross. And he is, through the Spirit, free from the power of sin in his daily life. He is also free from the Law with its demands and threats. As Christ carried His cross and hung upon it, He bore the penalty that was due because of the Law and ended its tyranny once and for all. We are called into liberty because we are called into the grace of God.

The truth is that true freedom cannot exist without boundaries. "Freedom and discipline have come to be regarded as mutually exclusive, when in fact freedom is not at all the opposite, but the final reward, of discipline. It is to be bought with a high price, not merely claimed.

... The [professional] skater and [race] horse are free to perform as they do only because they have been subjected to countless hours of grueling work, rigidly prescribed, and faithfully carried out. Men are free to soar into space because they have willingly confined themselves in a tiny capsule designed and produced by highly trained scientists and craftsmen who have meticulously followed instructions and submitted themselves to rules which others defined." Elisabeth Elliot in All That Was Ever Ours. Christianity Today.

Freedom is not free, and with freedom comes responsibility. We have to decide what we will do with our freedom in Christ. In our country we have been given freedom. The problem our country seems to have at times is that we have forgotten that with freedom comes responsibility. The Founding Fathers understood that how a person uses their liberty or freedom will determine how well the nation would function. Even more so, Christians have responsibilities that come with our gift of freedom. We have to decide if we are going to use the gift of freedom or

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abuse the gift. **"For you were called to freedom, brothers. Only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for the flesh, but through love serve one another. 14 For the whole law is fulfilled in one word: "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." (Galatians 5: 13-14)**

Another misstep is to misunderstand the true meaning of the grace of God. "If you do away with rules and regulations," they say, "you will create chaos and anarchy." Of course, that danger is real, not because God's grace fails, but because men fail of the grace of God **"See to it that no one comes short of the grace of God; that no root of bitterness springing up causes trouble, and by it many be defiled;" (Hebrews 12:15).** We know there is a "true grace of God" according to 1 Peter 5: 12 because it says, ". . . **I have written to you briefly, exhorting and testifying that this is the true grace of God. Stand firm in it!" (1 Peter 5:12).** So too, there is also a false grace of God and there are false teachers, ". . . **ungodly persons who turn the grace of our God into licentiousness and deny our only Master and Lord, Jesus Christ."** (Jude 4). So, Paul's caution is a valid one. Christian liberty is not a license to sin but an opportunity to serve. This leads to a commandment: ". . . **but through love serve one another"** (Galatians 5:13). The key word, of course, is love. The formula looks something like this:

liberty + love = service to others

liberty - love = license (or slavery to sin)

Our freedom is something that we can use in many ways then: for God and His kingdom, as something that we can abuse and use for our own selfish benefit, or as a license. Should we choose to reject it, we can turn our freedom into legalism.

The irony of true freedom is that it is found in servitude. When Paul says, serve one another he uses a word normally employed in the context of slavery. The person who is set free from both slavery to law and slavery to self will find true freedom as the slave of Christ, and as an eager servant of the community of believers. Just as the old law brought bondage and death, the new law of Christ introduces the believer into an exciting new community where people are free to love each other and serve each other's needs. It is unfortunate that most people would sum up the spirit and intention of God's laws as "Thou shalt not." What God would really rather see us do is rush from opportunity to opportunity, always eager to serve others. Law builds fences around what we must not do; love builds bridges to new places of service for our brothers and sisters in the Lord.
