The Suffering Church

The suffering Church is a witness to the suffering of Jesus. In our day we often talk about witnessing for Jesus. For us that usually means talking about Jesus. We forget that our word "martyr" comes from the Greek word for witness. Christians around the world who suffer and die for the sake of Jesus is the highest form of witness to Jesus. The Word of God teaches us how we should respond—both those who are suffering persecution and those of whom suffering has yet to come. I would like to mention briefly three ways in which the Church should respond to the persecution and suffering of the church in the name of Jesus.

First, those who are suffering persecution are called to witness with faithful endurance. As we read in Luke "Then he [Jesus] said to them, 'Nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom. There will be great earthquakes, and in various places famines and pestilences. And there will be terrors and great signs

from heaven. But before all this they will lay their hands on you and persecute you, delivering you up to the synagogues and prisons, and you will be brought before kings and governors for my name's sake. This will be your opportunity to bear witness.'" (Luke 21: 10-13) God sends His people into the world so that even in their suffering, they may be His witnesses, but He does not send them alone. The very One who Himself suffered death on the cross has said, ". . . behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age." (Matthew 28:20). And not only does Jesus go with His people, He has placed His own Spirit within them, the Comforter sent by the Father in whose comfort the Church does not merely endure the persecution of this world, but in its suffering the Church conquers it by the love of God in Christ "Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? Shall tribulation, or distress,

or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword? Just as it is written, 'For Thy sake we are being put to death all day long; we were considered as sheep to be slaughtered.' But in all these things we overwhelmingly conquer through Him who loved us." (Romans 8:35-37) By faithful endurance the persecuted Church witnesses to the redemptive power of God's grace. God has promised to strengthen His Church for that faithful endurance and reward its faithful witness. John wrote to the church in Smyrna: "Do not fear what you are about to suffer. . . . Be faithful until death, and I will give you the crown of life." (Revelation 2: 10)

Second, Christians are called to respond to persecution with prayer. Paul, writing to the church in Thessalonica, reminded believers: "Finally, brethren, pray for us that the word of the Lord may spread rapidly and be glorified, just as it did also with you; and that we may be delivered from perverse and evil men; for not all have faith." (2Thessalonians 3:1-2)

In addition to praying for

those who are suffering persecution for Jesus' sake, we are also commanded to pray for those who are killing, torturing, maiming, and imprisoning the people of God, as Jesus taught, **"But I say to you, love your enemies, and pray for those who persecute you."** (Matthew 5 :44) Those who are persecuted and those who by God's grace are spared suffering are both called to pray and call upon God to sustain them in their time of suffering, to deliver them if it be His will and to forgive those who persecute the Church and by our witness hopefully to win the persecutor for Jesus.

Finally—and this is especially for us who have been spared persecution, God's Word teaches that we should come to the aid of those who are suffering in His name. However divided the Church may be in our age, we remain united as members of the one body of Christ. Of this one body of Christ the Scripture teaches: **"And if one member suffers, all the members suffer with it; if one member is honored, all the members rejoice with it. Now you are Christ's body, and individually members of it. (1Corinthians 12:26-27)** It is God's will that the members of His body care for one another in need as they have opportunity. God has spared us the persecution which others endure so that we can be his instruments to serve them and by serving them; honor and witness to the name of Jesus.

In summary what is God's Word to the Church today, as Christians around the world suffer and die for the sake of Jesus? First, be a faithful witness yourself. Second, pray—both for the persecuted and for those who persecute Jesus by persecuting His Church. Finally, help those who are suffering for Jesus' sake, if you know of a way that you can help, do it. **"Remember the prisoners, as though in prison with them, and those who are ill-treated, since you yourselves also are in the body."** (Hebrews 13:3)


mom and aunt displayed her decorated wares for sale to help finance the trip.


