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Last month we looked at loving God through praise. This month we examine loving God through prayer.

Psalm 116 is a good place to start. **"I love the LORD, because He hears My voice and my supplications. 2 Because He has inclined His ear to me, Therefore I shall call upon Him as long as I live."** (Psalm 116: 1-2)

The whole psalm is an expression of love of gratitude to God. The writer is saying, "I love the Lord because He took time for me. He didn't blow me off. He didn't treat me like a second class citizen. He saved me from the living hell that my life had become. He saved me in every way a person can be saved. And because He is so compassionate and loving and good to me, I will love Him and serve Him for the rest of my life!"

A pastor tells this story, "At Chilton Village, there's a resident there who has Alzheimer's disease. And I noticed that everyday at lunch time, there was this lady who would help him eat his food. She talked to him. She wiped

his chin. She cleaned off the table. And I was impressed by how caring a staff person she seemed to be. And so I said, "I can tell you really care about your patient. I see you helping him eat every day." And she said, "He's not my patient. He's my husband." I never actually heard her say the words, 'I love you.' But she demonstrated her love every single day. In the way she tended to her ailing husband. Even though he could no longer be at home with her, she brought a little bit of home to him."

It's one thing to express love to someone you can touch, see and feel. But how do you express love for someone you can't touch or see or feel? How can we show the invisible, Almighty God that we really love Him? **Psalm 116: 12 What shall I render to the LORD For all His benefits toward me? 13 I shall lift up the cup of salvation And call upon the name of the LORD.** The first thing we should do is to talk to God,

every day.

When you first meet someone and you want to get to know that someone, you sit down and talk to them. You don't just sit together in silence. You ask them questions and you really listen to the answers because you know that back and forth communication is needed to get past the superficial. That's what God wants with us. He wants us to go beyond the superficial. He's not only interested in your wish list. He's interested in your companionship, your trust and your love. In Psalm 116, the writer senses this. And that's why he says in verse 2: **"I shall call upon Him as long as I live."**

God invites us to call out to Him. **'Call to Me, and I will answer you, and show you great and mighty things, which you do not know.'** (Jeremiah 33:3) Throughout the Bible there are examples of God's people who called out to Him. Moses cried out to God, and God spared Israel from judgment. Joshua's prayer made the sun stand still. Hannah's prayer was answered with a baby boy. Solomon got wisdom in answer to his prayer. Fire came down from Heaven when Elijah

prayed and devoured the sacrifice on Mount Carmel. Jonah's prayer brought him out of the belly of the great fish. Elijah had the great power of God upon his life. But when Elisha prayed for a double portion of the Spirit, God did not bat an eye when He gave it to him. Ten lepers prayed and were instantaneously healed. Peter prayed, and Dorcas arose from the dead. The thief on the cross prayed and was saved. The early church prayed, and the place where they were gathered together was shaken. Peter got out of jail in answer to the early Christians' prayers. The door of the Philippian jail fell off when Paul and Silas prayed and praised God.

Seven People Who Ought To Pray

1. People in Trouble Ought to Pray. The psalmist said, "This poor man cried, and the LORD heard him And saved him out of all his troubles." (Psalm 34: 6)

2. People Who Need Wisdom Ought to Pray. "But if any of you lacks wisdom, let him ask of God, who gives to all generously and without reproach, and it will be given to him." (James 1: 5)

3. People Who Need Power Ought to Pray. Jesus said, "Now suppose one of you fathers is asked by his son for a fish; he will not give him a snake instead of a fish, will he? Or if he is asked for an egg, he will not give him a scorpion, will he? If you then, being evil, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will your heavenly Father give the Holy Spirit to those who ask Him?" (Luke 11:11-13)

4. People Who Want Revival Ought to Pray. "If My people who are called by My name will humble themselves, and pray and seek My face, and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin and heal their land." (2 Chronicles 7:14).

5. People Who Want Cleansing Ought to Pray. David prayed, "Search me, O God, and know my heart; Try me, and know my anxieties; And see if there is any wicked way in me, And lead me in the way everlasting." (Psalm 139:23-24).

6. People Who Want to Know God's Way Ought to Pray. Moses prayed, "Now therefore, I pray, if I have found grace in Your sight, show me now Your way, that I may know You and that I may find grace in Your sight. And consider that this nation is Your people." (Exodus 33:13).

7. People Who Want to Be Saved Ought to Pray. Peter cried out, "Lord, save me" (Matthew 14:30). The Apostle Paul admonished us to "Pray without ceasing" (I Thessalonians 5:17). Jesus said, "Men ought always to pray, and not to faint" (Luke 18:1).

Remember that prayer is the Christian's greatest privilege and a great expression of our love for God. Prayer is his greatest tool, his greatest weapon and his greatest opportunity. It is the key to God's storehouse, the switch to God's power station and the greatest work in which one can become involved.. May all of us say, with Samuel, "God forbid that I should sin against the Lord in ceasing to pray for you" (1 Samuel 12:23).

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What the Bible Means


A father was approached by his small son who told him proudly, "I know what the Bible means!"

"That's easy, Daddy," the young boy replied excitedly. "It stands for 'Basic Information Before Leaving Earth.'"


