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## Forgive Each Other

Paul tells us, "Get rid of all bitterness, rage and anger, brawling and slander, along with every form of malice. Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you." (Ephesians 4:31-32) Did you catch that? The three essential ingredients in getting rid of bitterness, anger, slander and every form of malice are: be kind to one another; be compassionate towards one another and forgive each other. We looked at "Be kind to one another" in August and we looked at "Be compassionate" last month, so we will examine "Forgive each other" this month

I believe the reason Paul put "forgive each other" last is because I don't think we can really forgive somebody until we have learned to be kind and compassionate towards them. Let me remind you of Henry W. Longfellow words from last month's article, "If we could read the secret history of our enemies, we should find in each man's life sorrow and suffering enough to disarm all hostility." Put another way if we could just see what the other person has

been through and the pains and disappointments they have suffered, it would open the door of our heart to them so that we would be kind to them, compassionate towards them and even forgive them.

Forgiveness is not easy. C. S. Lewis said, "Everyone says forgiveness is a lovely idea until they have something to forgive." We all understand how true that is and that is why we are often tempted to be unforgiving. But unforgiveness is like drinking a deadly poison in hopes that it will kill your enemy.

Knowing forgiveness isn't easy, Paul gives us the added incentive "...forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you. (Ephesians 4:32) When you remember the debts that you have been forgiven, it is easier to forgive others. In forgiving us, God did not turn a blind eye to our sin. He did not deny its existence. Rather, He dealt with our sin appropriately by forgiving us (after paying sin's debt, which we

ourselves cannot do). Likewise, forgiving others does not require that we deny that an offense has

taken place. God does not expect us to live in denial. Instead, we should admit our hurt and acknowledge our pain. When God saw the sinfulness of mankind in Noah's day, the Bible acknowledges His grief. "The LORD was grieved that he had made man on the earth, and his heart was filled with pain." (Genesis 6:6) God gets emotional about our sin against Him. Yet, He forgives us. Likewise, in forgiving others, we are not asked to deny the reality of the offense or the depth of the hurt.

In forgiving us, God did not approve of our sin. God hates sin. But he loves us. Likewise, we are not expected to approve or excuse the other person's offense. But we are expected to forgive.

In forgiving us, God has given us a "clean slate." Now, a common saying is that we should "forgive and forget." Often this is based on the notion that this is what God has done when He forgave our sin through Christ. One place we get this idea is from Jeremiah, "...for I will forgive their iniquity, and their sin I will remember no more."(Jeremiah 31:34) The idea though is not that God has amnesia regarding our sin, but instead it is that He will never bring them up again. He has determined that He will not allow our sin to ever again come between us. Likewise, when we truly forgive other people's offense, we choose to not let this offense remain a barrier in our relationship with the other person.

In forgiving us, God assumed the price for our sin. When we forgive others, we are saying, "I will trust God to work out justice in this matter and accept that for whatever purpose God has in mind, He has allowed me to experience this injustice." After years of betrayal, false accusations and imprisonment Joseph understood this perspective. "And Joseph said to them, Fear not; for am I in the place of God? As for you, you thought evil against me, but God meant it for good, to bring about that many people should be kept alive, as they are this day." (Genesis 50:19-20)

David Yarbrough tells this story, "the wife of a Zulu chief happened to attend a meeting of Christians and heard for the very first time in her life about Jesus. The message of a God who loves us and forgives our sins was something new and wonderful for her to consider. She had never heard of such a God before. And it wasn't long until she became a Christian, too.

When her husband learned of this he angrily forbade her, on pain of death, ever to attend a Christian meeting again. However, eager to hear more about Jesus, she dared to go, and when her husband found out what she had done he met her on the trail and beat her so savagely that he left her for dead.

But it wasn't long until curiosity got the better of him and he went back to look for her. She was not on the trail where he had left her. But he did see broken twigs and other signs to indicate where she had crawled away. Following them he finally found her lying under a bush.

Cruelly, he asked, "And just what is your Jesus Christ doing for you now?" She opened her eyes, and looking at him, said gently, "He is helping me to forgive you!"

God calls us to forgive. The good news is that God helps us forgive, not just for the sake of those we forgive but for our own sake and for our own good. Forgiveness heals the hurts of the past. When we forgive, the wound heals and though there may be a scar, the pain is gone. God has given us the perfect example in that in Christ Jesus, God has forgiven us so much.
